Our theme for Advent and Christmas this year is 'Gifted', encouraging us to give thanks by recognising the gifts in one another.





Ampthill Methodist Mission Hub Meetings are held fortnightly on Wednesday afternoons at 2.00pm followed by refreshments. All are welcome.

On 29 October, we were joined by Mariella Cook telling us about "Mary - The Flying Duchess of Bedford", who we learned was a proficient pilot, whose aviation activities earned her the title of the 'Flying Duchess'. She was the second daughter of the Rev Walter Tribe, rector of Stockbridge. She was born in Stockbridge in Hampshire on 26 September 1865. She spent much of her early life in India apart from a short interlude at Cheltenham Ladies College, during which time she met Lord Herbrand Russell, the youngest son of the 9th Duke of Bedford. The couple were married in 1888. Five years later, Mary and her husband unexpectedly became 11th Duke and Duchess of Bedford, following the sudden death of her brother-in-law, the 10th Duke of Bedford, who left no legitimate heir. They inherited more than 86,000 acres of land, including the Woburn Abbey estate in Bedfordshire with its long established pheasant shoot. Mary became the 'top lady shot' of her time and also established a private cottage hospital at Woburn Abbey for the benefit of the local community. Mary died at the age of 71 in 1937 when her private aeroplane crashed into the North Sea while she was on a solo flight. A remarkable woman who excelled in all sporting activities and also made a major contribution to the world of natural history and ornithology.

On 12 November we enjoyed a very educational talk with Caroline Chappell entitled "The Unknown Soldier" where we learnt about Rev David Railton who was ordained in 1908. During the 1st World War, he became very concerned at the number of 'unknown soldiers' and the fact they received no formal recognition for their war efforts and were left in unmarked graves. He arranged to fly several soldiers home in order for them to receive full military honours for their war efforts.

The Queen Mother started the tradition of leaving a wedding bouquet on the grave of the unknown soldier in Westminster Abbey, which continues to this day.

Our last November meeting is due on 26 November with Richard Luscombe talking about "An American at Wrest Park".

News from Paraguay

As the year moves through November Paraguay moves toward summer. Cold nights are now just history and soon every day will be as hot as the one before. This year November has been pleasant rather than hot. There have been quite a few wet days and that always keeps the temperature down.

Rain and then sunshine is one of the reasons everything in Paraguay is always so green.

The approaching end of the year also brings the end of the school year. Exams until mid November then that is it until late February.

It is also the time of school festivals. I went to the festival at Evangelina's school and that made a good night. Every class had their turn to dance in traditional costume on the open air stage. Everyone would have been practicing for a while to make sure they knew their dances.

This being Paraguay even though the smallest of the children were preschool nothing got started until after 10. Advertised start times have little meaning around here.

One interesting find on the shopping front came in the local supermarket. They have a freezer of frozen fish. I never know what I will find in there as it contains things people have caught on fishing trips and then sold to the supermarket. As such they might have a type of fish for sale, and then never again have it.

My discovery was to find they had a few frozen piranha. Not something I had seen before so a chance not to be missed. Grilled they were very nice, if rather bony.

I have also this month continued to keep busy showing people around. There are many more people coming to Paraguay now than in the past.

And I have one more thing to show them. In Paraguari one of the old steam locomotives has been brought out and installed next to the old station to form what will be a railway museum.
